Foreshore Walk Trail


The Wadjup - Gabbilju Project is nearing completion. This 7 km walk trail will run from the area near the Café at the Old Riverton Bridge to the Yagan Reserve which lies at the far end of the Bull Creek just near Leach Highway.

Interpretive panels will be placed at various points along the route to provide information about that area of the foreshore. This project aims to conserve the heritage of the area, while at the same time raising awareness. The panels and bases are currently being manufactured and will then be attached and placed along the trail. At the time of writing it is anticipated that these will be in place towards the end of 2013/2014.

The City of Canning's Interpretive Consultant, Ms Susan Harris of Ecomedia, has undertaken extensive research and consultation for the project. Wadjup is the indigenous name for the Canning flats on the shallows of the river, while Gabbilju refers to the Bull Creek inlet area.

Roe 8 Up-date

There has been quite a bit in the press of late about Roe 8.

So what happens now? How do the next stages play out?

Based on information supplied by Dr Mike Nahan's office, the RRSRA understands that following the EPA's approval there was a statutory 14 day period in which the EPA Report was open to appeal.

This closed on September 27th and it seems that there were 165 appeals. These will be investigated by the Office of the Appeals Convenor, and because of the complexity of the issues there is no statutory time frame for this to be completed by.

We understand the Premier has repeatedly said that Roe 8 will still happen and, that in Parliament this week, he reiterated the State Government's commitment to this vital highway extension.

We believe that the Treasurer has made it clear that until the environmental conditions have been sorted and priced, a more accurate estimate of the project cannot be given.

However, the RRSRA hopes that the Project would be 'shovel ready' for when funds become available.

While this seems a long and convoluted process, it is essential that each step is completed thoroughly given the sensitive nature of this project.

Your Association will continue to monitor the situation.





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CAT ACT 2011

From 1 November 2013, the full *Cat Act 2011* takes effect and will require all cats that have reached 6 months of age to be:

Microchipped; Sterilised; and Registered with the relevant local government. Cats will be required to wear a collar and registration tag to ensure that owned cats can be easily identified and returned to their owner.

2. What is the purpose of the *Cat Act 2011?*

Our new cat's laws are not only about encouraging responsible pet ownership they are also aimed at reducing the number of unwanted cats in the community and the number that are euthanised each year. Microchipping and registration will also ensure your cat is returned to you if they become lost.

5. Who will enforce the legislation and how will it be funded?

The Cat Act relies on local governments to administer and enforce it. The Government has provided funding to local governments to assist with the implementation of the legislation.

17. I have bought a new cat, what are my responsibilities?

All cats sold after the commencement of this legislation must be sterilised and microchipped. If you have purchased the cat before this date then you will have until 1 November 2013 to have the cat sterilised or by the time the cat is 6 months old.

Once the cat is sterilised and microchipped, you need to provide this evidence to your local government to get it registered. Your local government will then issue you a registration tag which you must make sure your cat wears whenever it is in a public place.

You also need to check that the microchip details have been updated with the relevant microchip company, and registering local government if the cat was previously registered to another owner

72. What information does the microchip implanter need to record?

- a) the microchip barcode information or sticker
- b) the microchip number
- c) the microchip implanter's full name
- d) if the microchip implanter is a part of a company or organisation, the name of that company or organisation
- e) full contact details for the microchip implanter's company or organisation (if applicable)
- f) the date the cat was microchipped
- g) the cat owner's full name, residential address, contact numbers and email address
- h) the address at which the cat is normally kept, and
- i) the cat's name, age, breed, colour, gender and sterilisation status of the cat.


75. Are there any penalties for the microchip implanters?

Yes, a maximum court-imposed fine of \$5,000 for failure to advise the microchip database company of the above information within seven days.

The Public Hearings phase of the Inquiry into the City of Canning began on October 21st with the first of a series of witnesses to be called.

Metropolitan Local Government Reform

In September, the RRSRA was invited to send representatives to a Public Meeting on 1 October 2013 for a Presentation on the proposed local government boundary changes between the Cities of Canning and Gosnells.

We understand all organisations registered with the City were invited. Four of your Committee were there. The Meeting was very well attended and a lively discussion followed a presentation by the consultant Mr Charles Johnston.

The Submissions from various Metropolitan Councils, closed on Friday October 4th with some 20 plus proposal's being received.

The process now moves to a new phase with the start of the Local Government Advisory Board's (LGAB) work to examine the change proposals and make its own recommendations to the Minister for Local Government.
